Manual Handling Deliveries, stacking shelves.	Staff may suffer strains or bruising injuries to their back or elsewhere, from handling heavy/bulky objects.	All staff are trained how to lift properly. Where possible and practical, items should be brought to waist height level to be sorted rather than from the floor level. Staff must avoid storing items on the floor and should never twist / stoop to reach these items. High shelves for light goods only. Trolley available for moving stock and staff trained how to use it safely. Staff encouraged to alternate/rotate job tasks to reduce the risks associated with prolonged exposure or repetitive motions. Stairs and walkways kept clear.	Low
Slips, trips and falls Doorways (rain), spillages, stock on floor, uneven surfaces. In winter, ice may pose an additional hazard	Staff and customers may suffer sprains, fractures or bruising if they trip over uneven surfaces, objects such as stock, or slip on spillages and fall.	Staff 'clean as they go' – good housekeeping maintained at all times All spillages will be cleaned up immediately Wet floor warning signs always used. Shop floor is only mopped when shop is closed. Door mats at entrance in wet weather. Floor in good condition. Good lighting in all areas. All trailing cables will be secured so that they do not create a hazard Staff wear sensible shoes.	Low
Contact with bleach and other cleaning chemicals	Staff doing cleaning risk skin irritation or eye damage from direct contact with cleaning chemicals. Vapour may cause breathing problems.	Mops, brushes and strong rubber gloves are provided and used. Staff shown how to use cleaning products safely, e.g. follow instructions on the label, dilute properly and never transfer to an unmarked container. Staff to check for dry, red or itchy skin on their hands – particularly as COVID-19 cleaning regime has increased exposure to cleaning products	
Electrical Damaged electrical equipment, wiring, sockets, switches & cables or broken or disconnected earth;	Staff could get electrical shocks or burns from faulty electrics, including portable electrical equipment – heaters, fans etc.	Qualified electrician is used for any electrical faults and general maintenance and undertakes a safety check of building electrics every five years. Staff trained to spot and report any defective plugs, discoloured sockets, damaged cable and on/off switches. Damaged electrical equipment is either removed from the area completely or a sign is placed on the equipment rendering it unfit for use.	Low
